REVELATION 4

Read this week's passage aloud before discussing together.

OBSERVATION

1. What are your personal observations about the passage?
 - What sticks out to you (words, phrases, concepts, themes)?
 - Why do these things stick out to you?
 - Does it remind you of other Bible passages?
2. Examine the context of the passage:
 - What's happening in the book before and after the passage?
 - What's going on in history at the time of the passage?
 - What type of literature or genre is the passage?
3. What was one of your main takeaways from Sunday's sermon?

INTERPRETATION

4. What questions does this passage raise for you?
5. What is implied in verse 2 by the fact that God is the "one seated on the throne"? Does this tell us anything about his role or relationship to other beings?
6. How is Jesus described here? How is this different than the ways we see him described in the Gospels? Why is it so different in this context?

APPLICATION

7. God is the undeniable center of heaven's worship. If others were to look at your life, would they say that you live like God is at the center of all things? Would they say that you treat God like he's holy (v. 8) and worthy (v. 11)? How can you respond this week to God's holiness and worth in a way that is similar to how these heavenly beings respond to him?

 - What's happening in the book before and after the passage?
 - What's going on in history at the time of the passage?

3. What was one of your main takeaways from Sunday's sermon?

INTERPRETATION

4. What questions does this passage raise for you?
5. Why does John weep when no one is found worthy to open the scroll (v. 4)? What does it say about Jesus that he can open this scroll?
6. How is Jesus described here? How is this different than the ways we see him described in the Gospels? Why is it so different in this context?

APPLICATION

7. How worthy do you really think Jesus is (vv. 9, 12)? Spend time tonight or this week worshipping Jesus who is the one who has redeemed God's people and holds the future.

INTERPRETATION

4. What questions does this passage raise for you?
5. Is the wrath of the Lamb (v. 16) mean spirited or unfair? How does seeing the vision of the martyrs under the altar help us understand God's judgment on the world better (vv. 9-11)?

APPLICATION

6. How should you apply this passage to your life? Consider how it applies to your thoughts, attitudes, habits, decisions, relationship with God, and relationships with others.
7. In what ways are you clinging to the world for your hope (comfort, prosperity, health, etc.)? Jesus is going to bring judgment on the world and these false sources of hope. How can you more fully transition your hope from what the world can give (but will pass away) to Jesus and live completely for his glory—even if it means suffering (like the martyrs in vv. 9-11)?

 - What's going on in history at the time of the passage?

INTERPRETATION

4. What questions does this passage raise for you?
5. Why do you think there is silence in heaven before the seven trumpets are blown (8:1)? What does this represent? Does it indicate God's patience? His hearing prayers before judging? A sobering moment before judgment?

APPLICATION

6. How should you apply this passage to your life? Consider how it applies to your thoughts, attitudes, habits, decisions, relationship with God, and relationships with others.
7. Are you sobered by the judgments that will be unsealed by God, while he keeps his children sealed under his protection (9:4)? How can you humble yourself this week under God, recognizing that he has the right to bring judgment on the earth?

4. What questions does this passage raise for you?
5. Why is the scroll of prophesying about the coming judgment sweet to John's taste then bitter in his stomach (vv. 9-10)? What is sweet about the coming judgment? What is bitter?

APPLICATION

6. How should you apply this passage to your life? Consider how it applies to your thoughts, attitudes, habits, decisions, relationship with God, and relationships with others.
7. What is harder for you to meditate on—the sweetness of God's mercy on some or the bitterness of his judgment on the world and sinners? Pray this week, asking God to help you accept the fullness of his good judgment and to help this be an opportunity for you to more fully know God for who he is in all his greatness, goodness, and holiness.

4. What questions does this passage raise for you?
5. What are some of the suffering words/phrases you notice in this passage (e.g.: "trample" v. 2, "make war on them" v. 7, etc.)?

APPLICATION

6. How should you apply this passage to your life? Consider how it applies to your thoughts, attitudes, habits, decisions, relationship with God, and relationships with others.
7. After the painful journey of the two witnesses in verses 3-10, God brings resurrection (vv. 11-13) and receives worship for bringing his kingdom (vv. 15-18). Do you believe that we will have to suffer in this life for Jesus if we are faithful witnesses? Do you believe that God will bring us resurrection and into his kingdom? Which of these do you need to remember more this week? Why?
